#### **Rationality in government support**

Theory of retrospective voting (Kramer, 1971; Fiorina, 1981; Lewis-Beck, 1988):

- People evaluate performance of government from the perspective of well-being changes;
- Increase of well-being determines raise of support; decrease determines negative trend in support;
- The economic factors are the basic predictors for support rate.

# Limitations to rationality (1)

- Natural disasters: people blame politicians and bureaucrats for events that are actually not under their control (Achen and Bartels, 2004; Cole, Healy and Werker, 2012)
- Exogenous economic shocks (Leigh, 2009)

## Limitations to rationality (2)

Irrelevant events:

- Sports: the results "on the eve" of the elections may shape electoral behavior (Healy, Malhotra, Mo, 2010)
- Christmas Lottery outcomes in Spain (Bagues and Esteve-Volart, 2011)

### Questions

- "Bread and circuses" where is the balance between rational choice and emotions in government support?
- How do results of national football team affect the support of government?
- Does the above effect depend on values of the society?

## **Voting or support?**

- Support rate gives more precised evaluation of incumbents performance by citizen;
- Usage of support rate excludes variations of strategic voting effects;
- Support rate provides more representative data for short-term effects analysis.

# Hypotheses

- (H1) Sports successes tend to increase level of popular support for government in short-term
- (H2) Sports defeats negatively affect rating of the government
- (H3) An effect of the sports successes/defeats tend to be less in more postmaterialist countries
- (H4) Volatility of the popularity function caused by sport events is less in more democratic countries.
- (H5) An effect of international sport competitions' outcomes tends to be less in more prosperous countries.
- (H6) An effect of sport events is less in the countries with higher level of happiness and subjective wellbeing.

### **Methodology and Sample**

- Multilevel time series analysis (September 1994 – September 2012)
- Twenty one country: 7 in Latin America and 14 in Eastern Europe
- Monthly popularity rate of government institutions

#### **Dependent Variable**

Monthly support rates of:

- President in case of President Republics
- Government in Parliamentary Republics

Finals of International club tournaments

#### Olympics

2<sup>nd</sup> "national sport" results on the international arena

#### Impact on support of government

### **Control Variables**

- GDP per capita
- Monthly Unemployment rate
- Monthly Inflation rate
- Democratic transition indicators (Polity IV, Freedom House)
- Ethnic heterogenity
- Value proxies from the WVS Data: Postmaterialism, Satisfaction with live, Trust, Political Activism
- Significant events: disasters, wars, celebrations, national mourning, etc.

### **Potential Contribution**

- Irrelevant effects on government support
- Political processes in transit states
- Values transformation in democratization framework.
